“ *I'm sorry I'm unable to attend Miss Gasser's memorial. I'm actually scheduled to teach/facilitate that day and cannot miss class. In lieu of that, I want to share my condolences with the family for the loss of a truly elegant, bright, conscientious and kind woman who had a big influence on my 7th grade year at Santa Venetia Middle School.*

Miss Gasser inspired us every day, by writing a quote on the board at the beginning of her English class and asking us to write a paragraph describing our impressions/analysis. That made me curious about how other people think. As well, she had a mischievous sense of humor, which was at once a contrast to her strict classroom behavioral standards, but also, a welcome relief. I remember drawing pictures of her, which she would display on the wall behind her desk and when we had a recent correspondence, she remembered me as the artist!

One day, when Miss Gasser was absent, and we had a substitute, Miss Rossi (or "Bossy Rossi" as we called her,) I saw that as my opportunity to act up and left the classroom to use the restroom without a hall pass. Miss Gasser found out about that the next day, and I was called to her office to atone. She was not happy and I apologized, tears streaming down my face. I desperately wanted her approval and I wanted another chance to rise up to meet her high standards.

I appreciated Miss Gasser's cool demeanor, even when we unruly teenagers did our best to act out. I recall going back several times to re-visit her and her classroom, just to say "Hi" and she was always warm and welcoming, willing to pause from correcting her papers, to sit down and chat with me. I have no doubt that my interest in becoming a teacher/facilitator was partly due to her influence and my ardent hope is that I am inspiring my students/clients as much as Miss Gasser inspired me.

In closing, I'm glad to know she had such a long and vibrant life and was surrounded by such loving, caring family and friends. I am forever grateful for her positive influence in my life and for that special year we shared as teacher and student in 1974. Best, Susan Gilbert
